Reflections on Palm Sunday



The people of Jerusalem cut palm branches, waved them in the air, and laid them on the ground before Jesus as he rode into the city. The palm branch represented goodness & victory and it foreshadowed Christ's final victory over death.

"O death, where is your victory?" 1 Cor. 15:55

In those times, Kings rode grand horses into battle, but the donkey symbolized peaceful intentions. When Jesus arrived on a donkey, it showed he was the Prince of Peace. The people of Jerusalem were familiar with this Old Testment prophesy:

"Behold, your king is coming to you; righteous and having salvation is he, humble and mounted on a donkey" Zech. 9:9

When the people shouted "Hosanna!", they were hailing Christ as King. That word actually means "save now". In their own minds, they waited for an earthly king to fight their battles of the moment, but God had a different plan far greater than they could ever conceive. This is the reason we celebrate!
